He holds a PhD from UNB, a MAEd from MSVU, and undergraduate degrees in music and education from Bishop's University. His research is focused on Indigenous education, educational foundations, and curriculum theory.

Kim Stewart is an assistant professor at the UNB Faculty of Education. She has experience in the field of education as a teacher (both locally and internationally), principal, researcher, curriculum developer, and literacy subject coordinator. Kim's research investigates multiple ways of being literate across institutional and community spaces with a focus on strong literate identities. She completed her BA (Aboriginal Studies), BEd (Primary/Junior), and MA (Education) at the University of Ottawa. Her work and research are guided by her passion for curriculum theory, transformative teacher education, and language revitalization. She has published on theorizing reconciliatory pedagogies, reconceptualizing Indigenous teacher education, and articulating Indigenous resilience and innovation.
